Ice On days declining?

This winter will go down as the warmest in state history even surpassing the Pioneer Era record warm winter in 1877-1878. Did you realize that on Island / Mud Lakes the number of winter Ice On days from 2019 to 2021 was 149 days . The winter of 2020-21 had the least number of Ice On days with only 125 days, only to be followed by the winter of 2022-2023 with the most Ice on Days of 161. The winter of 2023-24 had a significant drop to only109 days. But looking forward to summer : do you realize we average 217 days with no Ice on the lakes!

<u>Pontoon Trailer</u> A special thanks to Mark Caspers for once again coordinating the pontoon trailer reservations! We continue to have good use of the trailer. Please remember that when you use the trailer:

- The trailer is stored on private property, please do not wander around the property or disturb anything
- Review the information sheet on usage prior to using,
- Report any issues when returned,
- Weekends are very busy so return in the timeline you made your reservation,
- Your membership dues provide you free use of the trailer,
- The trailer <u>cannot be used</u> to transport pontoons to other lakes, it is but one way we are working to prevent Aquatic Invasive Species from entering our lakes!

We've all seen boats and pontoons stored over winter with the blue or white plastic wraps. We even have a few boats that are wrapped and stored around our lakes. Ever wonder what happens with that material or is there a reuse for it? Here is some interesting news that looks into how the wrap can be reused.

Sailing Towards Sustainability: Minnesota's New Initiative to Recycle Boat Wrap

As Minnesotans, we cherish our pristine lakes and waterways, but with this natural beauty comes a profound responsibility to safeguard it for generations to come. One pressing challenge we face is the proper disposal of boat wrap, a plastic material used to shield boats during storage. Enter the Boat Wrap Product Stewardship Program, a forward-thinking bill designed to revolutionize the way we handle boat wrap waste across the state. At its core, this program mandates boat wrap producers to spearhead a comprehensive recycling initiative that reduces boat wrap in landfills and establishes robust agreements for collection, transportation, and processing.

But the momentum doesn't stop there. We're also witnessing groundbreaking advancements in mechanical technology right here in Minnesota, offering chemical-free and toxin-free methods for recycling boat plastic. A company in Rogers, Minnesota is leading the charge in implementing this technology. This cutting-edge approach fosters a circular economy by transforming boat plastic into resin, which can then be reincorporated into the production of new boat plastic.

With local companies leading the charge in implementing this innovative technology, the path towards a sustainable solution for boat plastic recycling has never looked brighter. By harnessing these capabilities, we're not only minimizing environmental impact but also strengthening our commitment to preserving the natural wonders of our beloved state.



In 2003 Minnesota's loon population was about 12,000 birds, and the numbers appear stable. There are, however, some potential threats to the long-term survival and status of loon populations. One of those is the threat posed by lead fishing sinkers and jigs.



The Minnesota Pollution Control Agency did a study to examine

loons for high mercury concentrations. The mercury study incidentally discovered that loons were dying from lead poisoning. Out of 101 dead loons that were analyzed, a total of seven died of lead poisoning and an equal number died from fish line entanglement. The fish line problem is fairly straightforward and can be reduced by urging anglers to avoid disposing of waste fish line in our lakes. The lead poisoning problem is more complex.

Biologists have studied the effects of lead sinkers and jigs on water birds and birds of prey since the 1970s. In areas where loons breed, lead poisoning from sinkers or jigs may account for up to 50 percent of the dead adult loons found by researchers.

One lead sinker can poison a loon

A loon with lead poisoning behaves strangely. It may fly poorly, have crash landings or stagger onto the ground. The loon begins to gasp, tremble, and its wings droop as lead is carried through its blood stream. As the poisoning worsens, it eats very little and hides among aquatic vegetation, staying behind when other birds migrate. It becomes emaciated and often dies within two or three weeks after swallowing the lead jig or sinker. It takes only one lead sinker or jig to poison a loon.

You can help

Give nontoxic sinkers a try. Currently there are many nontoxic sinker alternatives on the market made out of bismuth, tin, stainless steel, tungsten, ceramic, recycled glass and natural granite.

How Can I dispose of my old lead sinkers?

Bring all your old lead jigs, sinkers or other lead object's to the IMLPOA picnic in July and we will see that it is properly recycled.

During 2024 the Island Mud Lake Property Owners Association is celebrating the 45th anniversary of our initial formation. On July 7th 1979 the first annual meeting of the Association occurred with 40 individuals representing 25 properties gathering to organize and elect officers. The Association was an 'informal' organization until April 11, 1986 when our Non-Profit Articles of Incorporation were filed with the Minnesota Secretary of State. We have come a long way since that initial meeting! Today we have over 104 member properties representing 90% of the properties on the lakes and more than ever we continue to achieve the initial goals of the Association organizers: "by providing channels for members to share information and resources to protect and preserve the quality of the lakes, surrounding wildlife and fish habitat, and related natural resources for future generations".
